- **Corrected:** “The man in the blue suit was stopped by a police officer.”

## Examples of Dangling Modifiers

- **Dangling:** “Walking through the park, the flowers were beautiful.” (Who is walking? The flowers cannot walk. The modifier dangles because the subject is missing.)
- **Corrected:** “Walking through the park, I thought the flowers were beautiful.”
- **Dangling:** “Having finished the exam, the bell rang.” (Did the bell finish the exam? No. The sentence needs a clear subject.)
- **Corrected:** “Having finished the exam, the students heard the bell ring.”

These errors are common in both writing and speech. The best way to train your eye to spot them is through practice—and that is exactly what a **misplaced and dangling modifiers worksheet** provides.

Rewrite each sentence to eliminate the error.

- 1. The book was found by the student that had the torn cover.
- 2. Having been left in the sun, the ice cream melted.
- 3. He nearly drove his girlfriend to the airport every day.

**Possible corrections:** 1. The student found the book that had the torn cover. 2. Because the ice cream had been left in the sun, it melted. 3. He drove his girlfriend to the airport nearly every day.

## Exercise 3: Create Your Own

Write a sentence containing a dangling modifier, then correct it. Example: “Running late, the alarm clock didn’t go off.” Correction: “Because I was running late, I didn’t hear the alarm clock.”
