Question 2: Working with Fractions

Solution: Convert both fractions to a common denominator (8ths): 24 5/8 minus 7 6/8 equals 23 13/8 minus 7 6/8. This equals 16 7/8 inches.

Question 3: Volume of a Pipe

Scenario: What is the volume of a cylindrical pipe section with an inside diameter of 4 inches and a length of 10 feet? (Use $\pi = 3.1416$)

Solution: First, convert dimensions to consistent units. Radius = 2 inches = 0.1667 feet. Area of cross-section = $\pi \times r^2 = 3.1416 \times (0.1667)^2 = 0.0873 \text{ square feet}$. Volume = Area x Length = $0.0873 \times 10 = 0.873 \text{ cubic feet}$. In gallons, this would be approximately 6.53 gallons.

Scenario: An isometric drawing shows a pipe that runs north for 15 feet, then turns upward (vertical) for 8 feet, then turns east for 10 feet. What is the total developed length of the pipe?

Solution: Developed length is simply the sum of all segments: $15 + 8 + 10 = 33$ feet. This does not account for the actual straight-line distance from start to finish, which would require a 3D calculation.

SAFETY AND CODE COMPLIANCE

Scenario: A 100-foot long steel steam main operates at 150 psig saturated steam. Why must expansion loops or expansion joints be installed?

Answer: Steel expands significantly when heated. For example, carbon steel expands approximately 0.7 inches per 100 feet per 100°F temperature rise. Without expansion loops, the piping would buckle, stress flanges, and leak. The loop absorbs thermal expansion by bending.

Question 15: Pressure Reducing Valves

Scenario: A high-pressure steam line at 200 psi needs to supply equipment requiring 50 psi. What device is used, and what safety feature is required downstream?

Answer: A pressure reducing valve (PRV) is used. Downstream, a safety relief valve must be installed to protect the low-pressure system from overpressure in case the PRV fails open.
