## Can You Share or Reuse an Access Code?

This is a common question, especially among students trying to save money. The answer is generally no. Pearson access codes are designed for single use by one student. Once a code is redeemed on an account, it is locked to that account. Sharing a code with a friend is against Pearson's terms of service and may result in both accounts being suspended. Additionally, reuse across semesters is typically not allowed unless you purchased a multi-semester access product. Some newer programs offer inclusive access models where the cost is bundled into your tuition, but those are handled differently.
