For Struggling g Readers

Use a clear, sans-serif font and plenty of white space. Break long paragraphs into bullet points or numbered steps. Provide a word bank at the top of the worksheet with key terms like *hypothesis*, *variable*, *control*, and *conclusion*. The worksheet should not be a reading test; it should be a thinking test.
