Step 1: Prepare Your Workspace and Containers

Start by laying down newspaper or an old towel on a flat, heat-stable surface. Clean your glass containers thoroughly with hot, soapy water and dry them completely. Any dust or moisture can cause issues with how the wax adheres to the glass and can

affect the burn. Attach your wick to the bottom center of the jar using a wick sticker or a dab of hot glue. Press firmly to ensure it is secure. Then, use your wick centering tool, a pencil, or a straw laid across the top of the jar to hold the wick upright and perfectly centered. Trim the wick to extend about 4-5 inches above the container's rim to allow for easy centering and later trimming.

Step 2: Measure and Melt Your Wax

Weigh your wax on your kitchen scale. A good rule of thumb is to use slightly more wax than the volume of your container, as you will lose a small amount to the pouring pitcher. For a 8 oz jar, start with about 7.5-8 oz of wax flakes. Place the wax in your pouring pitcher or a heat-safe bowl. Create a double boiler by placing the pitcher in a pot filled with about 1-2 inches of water. Heat the water on medium-low heat. Never let the pot boil dry. Stir the wax gently with your spatula as it melts to help it liquefy evenly. Monitor the temperature with your thermometer. The target temperature depends on your wax, but for most soy waxes, you are aiming for about 170-185°F (77-85°C). Do not overheat the wax.

Step 3: Cool and Add Your Essential Oils

Once all the wax is completely melted and has reached the desired temperature, carefully remove the pitcher from the heat using oven mitts (the handle will be hot). Let the wax cool to the recommended temperature for adding fragrance. This is typically around 150-160°F (65-71°C) for most natural waxes and essential oils. At this point, add your pre-measured essential oils. For a 10 oz batch with a 7% fragrance load, you would add about 0.7 oz (approximately 20 ml) of essential oil. Stir the wax and oil gently but thoroughly for at least one minute to ensure the oils are fully integrated. Over-stirring can introduce air bubbles, so be gentle but complete.

Step 4: Pour the Wax into the Container

Pouring temperature is critical. For most soy and coconut waxes, the ideal pouring temperature is around 135-145°F (57-63°C). If the wax is too hot, it can cause the fragrance to "burn off" and result in a poor scent throw. If it is too cool, you may get a bumpy or uneven surface. Slowly and carefully pour the melted wax into your prepared container. Pour gently to avoid splashing, and leave a little space at the top, typically about half an inch from the rim. This is the headspace needed for the candle to burn safely.

Step 5: Let the Candle Cure and Set

Once poured, place your candle on a level surface and let it cool undisturbed for at least 24 hours. Do not move it, touch it, or blow on it. Rapid cooling can cause cracks or sinkholes. After 24 hours, you can check the surface. Sometimes, a small sinkhole

may form around the wick. This is normal. If this happens, you can do a "top-off" pour by melting a small amount of wax and filling in the sinkhole. After the candle is fully set, trim the wick to about 1/4 inch above the wax surface. This is the ideal length for a clean, non-smoky burn.

Troubleshooting Common Candle Problems

- **Tunneling:** This happens when the candle burns straight down the middle, leaving a wall of unmelted wax around the edges. It is usually caused by a wick that is too small or by not burning the candle long enough on the first burn (the first burn should create a full melt pool that reaches the edges).
- **Soot or Smoking:** This can be caused by a wick that is too large, burning the candle in a draft, or not trimming the wick to 1/4 inch before each burn. It can also happen if the wax is overheated during the melting process.
- **Frosting:** White, crystallized patches that appear on the surface of soy candles. This is a natural characteristic of soy wax and is not a defect. It is caused by the wax cooling too slowly. To minimize frosting, pour at a higher temperature and cool in a warm, stable environment.
- **Poor Scent Throw:** If your candle does not
