Why Students Struggle with Order of Operation S

Novices often make mistakes because they treat all operations

ORDER OF Moving from left to right without considering priority. For example, in the expression $3 + 4 \times 2$, a student might incorrectly compute $3 + 4 = 7$, then multiply by 2 to get 14. The correct answer is 11 (multiply first: $4 \times 2 = 8$, then add 3). Such errors reveal a gap in understanding the hierarchy of operations. This is where systematic practice using math worksheets on order of operations becomes invaluable. COMMON MISTAKES AND HOW WORKSHEETS HELP CORRECT THEM

Ignoring the “Left to Right” Rule

Students often believe that multiplication always comes before division, or addition always before subtraction. Misapplying Parentheses Through Exponents

Repeated practice builds the habit of working from the innermost set outward.

Rushing

Exponents are often the most intimidating step. Learners might treat 3^2 as 3×2 instead of 3×3 . By including exponents in a gradual, predictable way, worksheets help demystify them.
