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THE UNFORGETTABLE CAST OF PHANTOM OF THE OPERA 25TH ANNIVERSARY

Hadley Fraser as Raoul de Chagny

Fraser, a veteran of London's West End, showcased a rich baritone voice in songs like "All I Ask of You." His Raoul was not merely a jealous rival but a genuinely caring figure, making the love triangle all the more poignant. Fraser's dynamic with both Boggess and Karimloo added depth to the story's central conflict. He also had a memorable moment during the curtain call, when he joined the ensemble in playful homage to the original cast.

Wendy Ferguson as Carlotta Giudicelli

Every Phantom production needs a flamboyant, scene-stealing prima donna, and Wendy Ferguson delivered that and more. As Carlotta, she brought comedic timing and a powerful operatic voice that skewered the character's vanity. Her performance of "Think of Me" (before being interrupted by the Phantom) was both technically impressive and hilariously over the top. Ferguson's Carlotta was a perfect foil to Christine's purity, and her interactions with the managers and the ballet chorus added lightness to the otherwise dark tale. She was a vital part of the **Cast Of Phantom Of The Opera 25th Anniversary**.

Barry James as Monsieur Firmin

Barry James, a seasoned West End actor, played the pragmatic and often exasperated Monsieur Firmin. His comedic exchanges with Gareth Snook's André provided much-needed relief from the intense drama. James brought a stern but ultimately good-natured energy to the role, and his voice anchored the ensemble numbers. His portrayal kept the character distinct from the more flamboyant André, creating a classic double-act that audiences adored.

Gareth Snook as Monsieur André

Gareth Snook's Monsieur André was the more excitable and superstitious of the two new opera house managers. Snook's performance was full of physical comedy and exaggerated reactions, especially during the "Notes" sequence and the auction scene. His chemistry with Barry James was palpable, and together they evoked the original 1986 cast's dynamic. Snook's tenor voice added brightness to the ensemble pieces, and his character's gradual descent into paranoia under the Phantom's tyranny was portrayed with both humor and pathos.

Wynne Evans as Ubaldo Piangi

The role of the portly, self-important tenor Piangi was masterfully played by Wynne Evans, a classically trained Welsh tenor. Evans brought a booming voice and a lovable buffoonery to the character. His performance of "Don Juan Triumphant" during the masquerade and the opera-within-an-opera was a highlight, showcasing his vocal prowess. Evans's Piangi was both comic and tragic, especially given his grim fate in the story. He was a perfect foil to Carlotta, and his presence enriched the behind-the-scenes flavour of the production.

Additional Principal Roles

The **Cast Of Phantom Of The Opera 25th Anniversary** also featured several other key performers. Annabelle Massey played the ballet mistress Madame Giry with an air of mystery and authority. Katie Hall and Daisy Hull were among the ballet chorus, and Nick Boyes played the auctioneer in the opening scene. The Phantom's "Angel of Music" and the stagehands were all portrayed by a talented ensemble of actors, singers, and dancers who brought the Paris Opera House to life. The production's attention to detail included choreography by Liam Steel and direction by Laurence Connor, ensuring that every performer, no matter how small the role, contributed to the immersive experience.

THE SURPRISE GUEST APPEARANCES

One of the most talked-about moments of the evening was the surprise gathering of past and present Phantoms and Christines. After the final curtain call, the cast welcomed a series of legends. First, **Michael Crawford**, the original Phantom from 1986, stepped onto the stage, greeted by a standing ovation. He was followed by **Sarah Brightman**, the original Christine, who sang "The Phantom of the Opera" with Crawford. Then, other former Phantoms—John Owen-Jones, Anthony Warlow, Colm Wilkinson, and Peter Jöback—joined them on stage for a once-in-a-lifetime reprise of "The Music of the Night." This tribute not only honoured the legacy of the show but also demonstrated the deep bond among the **Cast Of Phantom Of The Opera 25th Anniversary** and its predecessors. The moment was emotional for fans and performers alike, capturing the timeless appeal of the musical.
