The balance sheet must balance: total assets must equal total liabilities plus owner's equity. If any of these relationships are off, trace back to the worksheet.

Step 5: Confirm Closing Entries

After journalizing and posting closing entries, your temporary accounts (revenue, expenses, income summary, and drawings) should have zero balances. The only accounts with balances should be permanent accounts: assets, liabilities, and owner's capital. Run a post-closing trial balance. It must balance. If it does not, review your closing entries. A common error is forgetting to close the income summary account to owner's capital after net income has been transferred.

USING ANSWER KEYS RESPONSIBLY
