- **Cooling system capacity:** Approximately 10 quarts (9.5 liters) for both engines.
- **Automatic transmission fluid:** ATF+4, capacity about 8.5 quarts (8.0 liters) for a full flush.

Always verify with your specific manual, as running changes during the model year may alter these numbers.

Tire Pressure and Rotation Schedule

The manual provides recommended cold tire inflation pressures for front and rear tires, typically 30–35 psi depending on load. It also outlines a tire rotation pattern (usually forward cross) every 6,000 to 8,000 miles. Maintaining proper tire pressure improves fuel economy and handling, which is especially important for a soft-top convertible where chassis rigidity is lower.
