- Punctuation: commas, semicolons, apostrophes
- Sentence structure: fragments, run-ons, parallel structure
- Transition words and logical organization

For the WritePlacer essay, practice writing five-paragraph essays in 50 minutes on topics like education, technology, or social issues. Use practice test prompts and have someone review your essay for coherence and grammar.

Mathematics

The math sections vary by test level. Focus on these broad categories:

- **Arithmetic:** fractions, decimals, percentages, order of operations, ratios

- **Quantitative Reasoning, Algebra, and Statistics (QAS):** linear equations, inequalities, functions, data interpretation, probability
- **Advanced Algebra and Functions (AAF):** quadratic equations, exponential functions, radicals, trigonometry basics

Work through practice test math sections step by step. If you get stuck, identify whether the error was computational or conceptual. Many students find that online video lessons paired with practice tests reinforce the concepts effectively.
