3. **Biographical Highlights** – Share key life events: education, career, military service, marriage, children, hobbies, and volunteer work. Use active language and be specific. Instead of “He liked fishing,” try “He spent countless weekends on Mosquito Lake, teaching his grandchildren how to bait a hook.”
4. **Surviving Family** – List immediate family members: spouse, children, grandchildren, great-grandchildren, siblings. Use full names and communities if possible.
5. **Predeceased Family** – Mention those who passed before, such as parents, spouses, or siblings. This helps genealogists connect generations.
6. **Service Information** – Dates, times, and locations of visitation, funeral, and burial. Include information about memorial donations if preferred by the family.
7. **A Personal Touch** – Many obituaries now include a short anecdote, a favorite quote, or a note about the person’s character. This makes the notice more meaningful to readers who may not have known the deceased well.
