We would love to meet you and hear your story. Let us get

started by lifting our hearts in praise.

## Template C: Family-Focused Setting with Many Children

Happy Easter, everyone! What a joy to see this room so full of families and smiling faces. I want to give a special welcome to all our children joining us today. Easter is a time for celebrating, and we have activities planned just for you during the service. Parents, we have a dedicated children's area with wonderful volunteers ready to share the Easter story with your kids in a way they will understand and love. For everyone here, no matter your age or background, we are so glad you are part of this celebration. Today we remember that Jesus died for us and rose again, and that is the best news we could ever hear. Let us begin our time of worship together.

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### **TIPS FOR DELIVERING YOUR WELCOME SPEECH FOR CHURCH EASTER PROGRAM**
