The Foundational Levels: 7A through A

Once a student reaches Level G, they are working with material typically taught in middle school and high school. These levels require abstract thinking and a solid grasp of foundational concepts.

- **Level G:** Focuses on linear equations, inequalities, and graphing. Grade equivalent: 7th to 8th grade.
- **Level H:** Covers systems of equations, functions, and more advanced graphing. Grade equivalent: 8th to 9th grade.
- **Level I:** Introduces geometry, including proofs, area, volume, and the Pythagorean theorem. Grade equivalent: 9th to 10th grade.
- **Level J:** Begins algebra II topics, including quadratic equations, factoring, and complex numbers. Grade equivalent: 10th to 11th grade.
- **Level K:** Focuses on trigonometry, logarithms, and exponential functions. Grade equivalent: 11th to 12th grade.
- **Level L:** Covers pre-calculus, including sequences, series, limits, and an introduction to derivatives. Grade equivalent: 12th grade or early college.
- **Level M:** The first calculus level, covering differentiation and its applications. Grade equivalent: College-level Calculus I.
- **Level N:** Continues with integration and its applications. Grade equivalent: College-level Calculus II.
- **Level O:** The final level, covering advanced calculus topics including differential equations. Grade equivalent: College-level Calculus III or beyond.
