Answer: The graph should show a straight line upward from (0,0) to (20,100), then a horizontal line from (20,100) to (30,100), then a straight line downward from (30,100) to (40,50).

The slope of the first segment is 5 m/s, and the slope of the last segment is -5 m/s.

Problem 4: Comparin g Two Journeys

Question: On the same graph, Car A travels 120 kilometers in 2 hours, and Car B travels 120 kilometers in 3 hours. Which car has the steeper line, and what does that indicate?

Answer: Car A has the steeper line because it covers the same distance in less time. The steeper line indicates a higher speed (60 km/h for Car

A compared to 40 km/h for Car B).

speed on the return is slower.

Problem 5: Real- World Scenario

Question: A runner starts at the 0-meter mark, runs to the 400-meter mark in 80 seconds, rests for 20 seconds, and then returns to the start in 100 seconds. Draw and describe the graph.

Answer: The graph has three segments: a rising line from (0,0) to (80,400) with a slope of 5 m/s, a horizontal line from (80,400) to (100,400) indicating rest, and a falling line from (100,400) to (200,0) with a slope of -4 m/s. The runner's

HOW TO CREATE A DISTANCE TIME GRAPH WORKSHEET WITH ANSWERS
