Plug the value back into the original equation to verify. For $2(3*(10/3) + 4) = 2(10 + 4) = 2*14 = 28$. Wait, that equals 28 not 20. Let's re-check: Original equation $2(3x+4)=20$, with $x=10/3$ gives $2(3*(10/3)+4)=2(10+4)=2*14=28$. That is incorrect. So we made an error. Actually, from $2(3x+4)=20$, distributing gives $6x+8=20$, then $6x=12$, $x=2$. Check: $2(3*2+4)=2(6+4)=2*10=20$. Correct. So careful: The example in Step 1 should be

consistent. Let me correct: For $2(3x + 4) = 20$, distribution gives $6x + 8 = 20$, then $6x = 12$, so $x = 2$. The steps remain valid.

Example 1: Simple Integer Equation

Solve: $4(2x + 1) = 36$.
Distribute: $8x + 4 = 36$. Subtract 4: $8x = 32$. Divide by 8: $x = 4$.
Check:
 $4(2 \cdot 4 + 1) = 4(8 + 1) = 4 \cdot 9 = 36$. Correct.

Example 2: With a

Negative Sign

Solve: $-(3x - 5) = 17$.
Distribute the negative: $-3x + 5 = 17$. Subtract 5: $-3x = 12$. Divide by -3: $x = -4$. Check: $-(3 \cdot (-4) - 5) = -(-12 - 5) = -(-17) = 17$. Correct.

Example

3:

Variables on Both Sides

Solve: $2(x + 3) = 3x - 4$. Distribute left: $2x + 6 = 3x - 4$. Subtract $2x$: $6 = x - 4$. Add 4: $10 = x$. Check: $2(10 + 3) = 2 \cdot 13 = 26$;

$3 \cdot 10 - 4 = 30 - 4 = 26$.
Correct.

For $(x+2)(x+3)$ you need FOIL, not simple distribution. *Fix: Recognize that a worksheet on solving equations uses only one set of parentheses initially.*

5. **Arithmetic errors in multiplication or addition.** *Fix: Slow down and double-check each step. Use a separate scratch paper.*

- Problem 1:

- Problem 2:
Distribute $\rightarrow -12x - 8 = -44 \rightarrow$ add 8
 $\rightarrow -12x = -36 \rightarrow x = 3$

- Problem 3:
Distribute $\rightarrow 5x + 20 = 3x + 28 \rightarrow$
subtract $3x \rightarrow 2x + 20 = 28 \rightarrow$
subtract $20 \rightarrow 2x = 8 \rightarrow x = 4$
- Problem 4:
Distribute $\rightarrow 6x - 2 + 4x = 18 \rightarrow$
combine like terms $\rightarrow 10x - 2 = 18 \rightarrow$ add $2 \rightarrow$
 $10x = 20 \rightarrow x = 2$
