
How To Use Beauty Blender

The material is latex-free and expands when wet, which is key to its performance. STEP 1: PREPARING YOUR BEAUTY BLENDER THE RIGHT WAY

STEP 2: APPLYING FOUNDATION WITH YOUR BEAUTY BLENDER

Now that your sponge is perfectly damp, it's time to apply foundation. The key principle is **stippling**—using a bouncing, dabbing motion rather than sweeping or rubbing.

1. **Dispense a small amount of foundation on the back of your hand or a palette.** Dot it sparingly on your face (forehead, cheeks, chin, nose). Alternatively, you can dot foundation directly onto the side of the damp sponge and then bounce it onto your skin.
2. **Use the rounded side for large areas.** Begin at the center of your face and bounce the sponge outward. Never drag the sponge; always press and release. This motion pushes the product into your skin for a natural, even finish.
3. **Blend in sections.** Don't try to blend your whole face at once. Work on one area (e.g., one cheek) before moving to the next. This prevents the foundation from drying before you blend.
4. **Use the pointed tip for precision.** The narrow end is perfect for the sides of the nose, the inner corners of the eyes, and around the lips. Bounce it gently to blend concealer or foundation in tight spots.

The stippling motion is crucial for a streak-free finish. It's also gentle on the skin and helps avoid disturbing your skincare underneath. Mastering this part of **how to use beauty blender** will instantly elevate your makeup game.

STEP 3: USING YOUR BEAUTY BLENDER FOR CONCEALER

A beauty blender isn't just for foundation. It's also excellent for concealer, especially under the eyes. Here's how:

- **Apply concealer in a triangle shape under your eyes.** Use a small amount. Let it sit for 30 seconds to warm up.
- **With a damp sponge, using the pointed tip, gently bounce the concealer into your skin.** Start from the inner corner and work outward. Avoid dragging the sponge, as that can

create creases.

- **For blemishes, use the tip to tap concealer directly onto the spot.** Then lightly bounce the edges to blend it into the surrounding foundation without removing the coverage.

STEP 5: APPLYING CREAM CONTOUR, HIGHLIGHTER, AND BLUSH

- **Contour:** Apply cream contour along your cheekbones, jawline, and forehead. Use the flat edge of the damp sponge to blend the product upward and outward with light bouncing motions. The sponge softens the lines so the contour looks like a natural shadow.

A beauty blender doesn't last forever. Over time, it loses its bounce, tears, or accumulates stains and smells even with regular cleaning. Signs it's time to toss it:

- The sponge feels hard or dense even when wet.
- It develops visible tears, cracks, or chunks missing.
- It has persistent stains that don't wash out (though stains alone aren't a deal-breaker if the sponge still functions well).
- It smells musty or moldy despite cleaning.
