HOW TO MAKE YOUR OWN STAINED GLASS WINDOW CRAFT: STEP-BY-STEP

Ready to create? Follow this simple guide to turn a template into a glowing window decoration.

Step 1: Gather Your Supplies

Print your chosen **Christmas Tissue Paper Stained Glass Window Template**. If

the template is a black outline on white paper, you may want to trace it onto black construction paper for a more authentic "lead" look. Alternatively, you can print directly onto black cardstock if your printer allows.

Step 2: Prepare the Tissue Paper

Cut or tear your tissue paper into small squares or irregular pieces. You don't need to be precise — in fact, slightly jagged edges often add to the stained glass texture. Sort the pieces by color

for easy access.

Step 3: Apply the Tissue Paper

There are two main methods:

- **Contact Paper Method:** Cut a piece of clear contact paper slightly larger than your template. Peel off the backing and place it sticky side up. Carefully press your template (with the outline facing you) onto the contact paper. Then, fill each section with tissue paper

pieces, pressing them down onto the sticky surface. When finished, cover with another piece of contact paper to seal it.

- **Glue Method:** If you're using a pre-cut template on black paper, simply apply a thin layer of school glue to the back of the paper (over the open spaces). Press tissue paper onto the glue. Let it dry completely before trimming any excess paper around the edges.

Step 4:

Trim and Display

Once all sections are filled and the glue is dry (or the contact paper is sealed), trim the edges of the project so it fits neatly in your window frame. Tape it directly to the glass using clear tape or double-sided tape. For a more polished look, you can even frame it with a thin strip of black paper.

TIPS FOR THE BEST RESULTS

To make your **Christmas Tissue Paper Stained Glass Window Templates** truly shine, keep these tips in mind.

- **Use bright, saturated colors.** Deep

reds, emerald greens, and royal blues look fantastic when backlit. Pale pastels may wash out.

- **Layer tissue paper.** Placing two different colors on top of each other creates a new shade. For example, yellow over blue makes green. This adds depth and complexity.
- **Don't forget the black outline.** The dark border is what gives the craft its stained glass appearance. Make sure it's thick enough to be visible from a distance.
- **Consider the**

light source.

Place your craft on a window that gets direct sunlight for the best effect. If you don't have a bright window, you can also shine a flashlight from behind.

- **Avoid over-crinkling.** While some texture is nice, heavily wrinkled tissue paper can look messy. Smooth pieces gently with your fingers as you apply them.

VARIATIONS AND ADVANCED IDEAS FOR EXPERIENCED CRAFTERS

Once you've mastered the basic technique, try these creative variations to take your

window art to the next level.

- **Add glitter or cellophane:** For extra sparkle, sprinkle fine glitter over the glue before adding the tissue paper, or use clear cellophane for a glossy effect.
- **Create a 3D effect:** Use multiple layers of tissue paper and black outlines to create a foreground and background. For instance, place a snowman closer to the glass and a tree behind it.
- **Make a whole scene:** Combine several smaller templates to cover an entire window with a holiday

panorama, such as a winter village or a stable with animals.

- **Use it for classroom decorations or holiday parties:** Set up a crafting station where each child can fill a template. Then, combine all the pieces to create a giant classroom window display.
