
Army Male Body Fat Worksheet

The United States Army maintains rigorous physical fitness and body composition standards to ensure every soldier is ready for duty. For male soldiers, one of the key tools used to assess body fat percentage is the **Army Male Body Fat Worksheet**. The worksheet records critical data such as height, neck circumference, and abdominal circumference. Using a specific formula—often the Department of Defense (DoD) equation—the worksheet produces an estimated body fat percentage. Soldiers who exceed the maximum allowed percentage may be flagged and required to enter a mandatory weight control program. HOW THE TAPE TEST WORKS

The tape test relies on a well-validated anthropometric formula for males. The key measurements are:

- **Height** – measured in inches without shoes.
- **Neck circumference** – measured just below the larynx, with the tape sloping downward slightly to avoid the Adam's apple.
- **Abdominal circumference** – measured at the level of the navel (belly button) with the abdomen relaxed.

These three values are entered into the formula, which accounts for the fact that neck circumference has an inverse relationship with body fat (a larger neck often indicates more muscle mass), while abdominal circumference has a direct relationship. The result is a percentage that estimates total body fat. The **Army Male Body Fat Worksheet** provides pre-calculated tables or a simple equation to derive this value, ensuring consistency across different units.

STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING THE WORKSHEET

To obtain accurate results, follow these precise steps when

1. **Prepare the Soldier:** The soldier should be in a relaxed stance, wearing minimal clothing (typically just PT shorts or uniform undershorts). No shoes. The tape measure must be non-stretchable, preferably fiberglass, and calibrated.

3. **Measure Neck Circumference:** Place the tape around the neck, just below the larynx (Adam's apple). The tape should be snug but not compressing the skin. Record to the nearest 0.5 inch. If the soldier has a very prominent larynx, take the measurement just below it.
4. **Measure Abdominal Circumference:** This is the most critical measurement. Position the tape around the abdomen at the level of the navel. The soldier should stand upright, arms at sides, and breathe normally. Take the measurement at the end of a normal exhalation. The tape should be horizontal and snug. Record to the nearest 0.5 inch.
5. **Perform Calculation:** Use the formula provided on the worksheet or the corresponding DoD body fat table. For the Army Male Body Fat Worksheet, the standard equation for males is: **% Body Fat = (86.010 x log10(abdomen - neck)) - (70.041 x log10(height)) + 36.76**. Most worksheets include a lookup table to avoid manual calculation.
6. **Compare to Standards:** Once you have the estimated

body fat percentage, refer to the age-based table printed on the worksheet. For example, a male soldier aged 17–20 must be at or below 20% body fat; ages 21–27 require $\leq 22\%$; 28–39 require $\leq 24\%$; and 40+ require $\leq 26\%$. Enter the soldier's age and standard.

7. **Document Results:** Fill in the date, soldier's name, unit, and assessor's signature. Flag any discrepancies or require a re-test if measurements seem inconsistent.

Proper documentation ensures accountability and allows the soldier to track progress over time.

UNDERSTANDING THE ARMY BODY FAT STANDARDS

The **Army Male Body Fat Worksheet** is directly tied to the Army Body Composition Program (AR 600-9). The maximum allowable body fat percentages vary by age because the Army recognizes that body composition naturally changes with age. The current standards are:

- 17–20 years old: 20% body fat
- 21–27 years old: 22% body fat
- 28–39 years old: 24% body fat
- 40 years and older: 26% body fat

These are the upper limits. The Army encourages soldiers to maintain lower percentages for optimal performance and health. Exceeding these limits results in a failure of the body composition assessment, which can lead to being enrolled in the ABCP, restriction from promotion, and potential separation if not corrected within a specified timeline. The worksheet serves as

the official record of that assessment, making its accurate completion vital for both the soldier and the command.

Height and Weight Screening Precedes the Tape Test

It is important to note that the **Army Male Body Fat Worksheet** is only used if a soldier fails the initial height and weight screening. Every soldier is first weighed and measured. If their weight falls within the maximum allowable weight for their height (per the Army Height and Weight Table), they pass and do not proceed to the tape test. Only those who exceed the screening weight undergo circumference measurements. This two-tiered system prevents unnecessary assessments for soldiers who are clearly within standards by weight.
