The gamble paid off spectacularly. **Friday** earned over \$28 million at the box office, a massive return on investment that signaled a shift in what kinds of stories could succeed in mainstream comedy. Before **Friday**, Chris Tucker was a relatively unknown stand-up comedian who had appeared in a few small roles. His performance as Smokey changed everything. From the moment he appears on screen, Tucker commands attention with a whirlwind of energy, rapid-fire dialogue, and physical comedy that is impossible to ignore. Smokey is the ultimate agent of chaos: a weed dealer who is perpetually high, perpetually in debt, and perpetually hilarious. Tucker's performance is so vivid that it elevated the entire film.

The role of Smokey was originally offered to several other actors, but when Tucker auditioned, he brought an improvisational energy that transformed the character.
