Replicating this at home requires attention to detail, but the ingredients are surprisingly simple. The secret lies in the technique and the quality of the components you choose.

INGREDIENTS FOR YOUR HOMEMADE MR KIPLING MANOR HOUSE CAKE RECIPE

To create an authentic tasting Manor House Cake, you will need to prepare three separate elements. Precision is key, especially with the pastry and topping.

For the

Shortcrust Pastry Base

- **250 grams plain flour** (all-purpose flour works well, but plain flour gives a finer crumb)
- **125 grams cold unsalted butter**, cubed (ensure it is very cold for a flaky texture)
- **50 grams caster sugar** (superfine sugar dissolves easily)
- **1 large egg yolk**
- **2-3 tablespoons cold water** (add gradually, only as needed)
- **A pinch of salt**

For the Morello Cherry Filling

- **400 grams jar of morello cherries** in syrup (drained, reserving 3 tablespoons of syrup)
- **2 tablespoons cornflour** (cornstarch)
- **50 grams granulated sugar**
- **1 teaspoon vanilla extract**
- **Squeeze of lemon juice** (to brighten the flavour)

For the Crumbly Topping

- **150 grams plain flour**
- **100 grams cold unsalted butter**, cubed
- **80 grams caster sugar**
- **50 grams ground almonds** (this adds a subtle nuttiness and helps create the signature crumbly texture)
- **1 teaspoon baking powder** (for a lighter crumb)

STEP-BY-STEP INSTRUCTIONS: CRAFTING THE

PERFECT CAKE

Follow these steps carefully to ensure your Manor House Cake turns out beautifully. Patience during the chilling stages is crucial for the best results.

Step 1: Prepare the Shortcrust Pastry

Begin by making the base. In a large mixing bowl, combine the plain flour and a pinch of salt. Add the cold, cubed butter. Using your fingertips, rub the butter into the flour until the mixture resembles fine

breadcrumbs. Stir in the caster sugar. Make a well in the centre and add the egg yolk. Gradually add the cold water, mixing with a fork or your hands until the dough just comes together. Do not overwork it. Form the dough into a disc, wrap it in cling film, and refrigerate for at least 30 minutes. Chilling the dough prevents shrinkage during baking and ensures a tender, crisp base.

Step 2: Make the Cherry Compote

Filling

While the pastry chills, prepare the filling. Drain the jar of morello cherries, reserving the syrup. In a small saucepan, combine the drained cherries, 3 tablespoons of the reserved syrup, the granulated sugar, vanilla extract, and a squeeze of lemon juice. In a separate small bowl, whisk the cornflour with 2 tablespoons of cold water to create a slurry. Bring the cherry mixture to a gentle simmer over medium heat. Pour the cornflour slurry in, stirring constantly. Continue to cook for 1-2 minutes until the mixture thickens significantly. Remove from heat and allow it to cool completely. The

filling will continue to set as it cools.

Step 3: Create the Crumbly Topping

In another bowl, combine the plain flour, ground almonds, caster sugar, and baking powder. Add the cold, cubed butter. Use your fingertips to rub the butter into the dry ingredients. This time, however, you want a slightly uneven texture. Some larger, pea-sized pieces of butter are desirable as they create the characteristic crumbly clusters on top of the cake. Do not overmix.

Place the topping in the refrigerator while you roll out the base.

Step 4: Assemble the Cake

Preheat your oven to 180°C (350°F) or 160°C (320°F) for a fan-assisted oven. Grease and line a 20cm x 20cm square baking tin or a similar sized rectangular traybake tin with baking parchment.

On a lightly floured surface, roll out the chilled pastry dough to a thickness of about 5mm. It should be large enough to line the base and go slightly up the sides of the tin (about 2cm up). Carefully lift the pastry into the tin, pressing it

gently into the corners. Prick the base all over with a fork to prevent it from bubbling up during baking. This is called docking.

Spread the cooled cherry compote evenly over the pastry base. Avoid going right to the edges, as the filling will spread during baking.

Remove the crumbly topping from the fridge. Using your hands, sprinkle the topping evenly over the cherry filling, covering it completely. Press it down very gently so it adheres to the filling, but do not compact it. You want a loose, crumbly texture.

Step 5: Bake to

Golden Perfection

Place the tin on the middle rack of your preheated oven. Bake for 35 to 40 minutes, or until the top is a deep golden brown and the filling is bubbling slightly at the edges. The aroma in your kitchen will be incredible. If the topping is browning too quickly, you can tent the tin loosely with foil for the last 10 minutes of baking.

Allow the cake to cool completely in the tin. This is essential. Cutting the cake while it is still warm will cause the filling to run and the crumbly top to break apart. Patience

is your best friend here. Once completely cool, lift the cake out using the parchment paper and place it on a cutting board.

EXPERT TIPS FOR A PROFESSIONAL FINISH

Even a straightforward recipe can be elevated with a few professional techniques.

- **Use Morello Cherries:** The original Mr Kipling cake uses morello cherries for a reason. They are tart and slightly sour, which balances the sweet pastry and topping perfectly. Sweet cherries will not give you the same authentic flavour.
- **Chill**

Everything:

Cold butter is non-negotiable for both the pastry and the topping. It creates steam as it melts in the oven, resulting in a flaky base and a crumbly top. If your butter gets warm, pop the mixture back in the fridge.

- **Don't Overwork the Pastry:**

Overworking develops gluten, which makes the base tough and chewy rather than tender and crisp. Mix just until combined.

- **Cool Completely:** I cannot stress this enough. Let the cake cool fully in the tin. For best results,

refrigerate it for an hour after cooling. This sets the filling and makes slicing much cleaner.

- **Use a Sharp Knife:** When slicing, use a sharp serrated knife and cut with a gentle sawing motion. This will help maintain the integrity of the crumbly top.

VARIATIONS ON THE CLASSIC RECIPE

Once you have mastered the original Mr Kipling Manor House Cake Recipe, you can experiment with different flavours.

Apple Raspberry and y and Cinnamon Almond n Mandorla House Variation Cake

Replace the morello cherry filling with a homemade apple compote. Cook peeled, diced apples with brown sugar, cinnamon, and a little lemon juice until soft and thick. Proceed with the same pastry and crumb topping. This version is especially lovely in autumn.

Use a good quality raspberry jam or a quick raspberry compote. Add a teaspoon of almond extract to the crumb topping instead of vanilla. The combination of raspberry and almond is a classic pairing that works beautifully with the buttery base.

Lemon and

Blueberry Twist

For a fresher, tangier take, use a blueberry compote made with fresh or frozen blueberries and lemon zest. Add the zest of one lemon to the pastry base and the crumb topping. The bright citrus notes will elevate the entire cake.

WHY BOTHER BAKING AT HOME?
