
I Lift Up My Eyes Unto The Hills Lyrics

shade upon thy right. The sun shall

4. *From every evil shall He keep thy
soul, and guard thy ways; Thy
going out and coming in, forever
and always.*

Note that the pronouns shift between first person ("I lift my eyes") and second person ("thy foot," "thy soul"), a common feature of many psalter versions that address the worshiper directly.

Contemporary and Choral Arrangements

In recent decades, new musical settings of Psalm 121 have become popular in contemporary Christian worship. Artists such as **Shane & Shane**, **Keith & Kristyn Getty**, and **Fernando Ortega** have recorded versions that blend modern instrumentation with the ancient text. The Getty version, for example, uses the refrain "I lift my eyes unto the hills" and often incorporates a Celtic-influenced melody. Other modern worship bands have written original songs that quote the psalm directly. The

enduring appeal of these lyrics lies in their simplicity and depth—they express a universal human need for help and protection.

THEOLOGICAL AND DEVOTIONAL MEANING OF THE LYRICS
