Vegetable Patch Toss

TREATS AND REFRESHMENTS: INSPIRED BY THE TALE

DECORATING THE TABLE: A PETER RABBIT FEAST

Rabbit in the center. Use floral napkins, mismatched vintage teacups, and wooden utensils. A banner reading “Welcome to the Garden” in cursive adds a final touch.

For the table setting, place a tiny chocolate egg at each plate as a favor. You can also write a small quote from Beatrix Potter on a card: “The sun was still bright, but the shadows were growing long.” This adds a literary touch that older guests will appreciate.

PHOTOGRAPHY AND MEMORIES

Capture the magic by setting up a photo booth area. A simple frame decorated with vines and silk flowers, or a bench with oversized rabbit ears, provides a perfect backdrop. Encourage parents to take pictures of children holding their baskets or pretending to sneak like Peter. You can also hire a photographer for a small fee, or designate a “photo volunteer.”

Share photos on social media with a hashtag like #PeterRabbitEaster or #MrMcGregorsGarden. This allows guests to relive the fun and promotes your event for future years. If you are hosting a public event, always get permission before sharing images of other people’s children.

ADAPTING FOR DIFFERENT GROUP SIZES AND BUDGETS
