Each subtest has roughly 20 questions, but the exact number can vary. The adaptive format means that if you answer a question correctly, the next one will be harder; if you answer

incorrectly, the next will be easier. This design efficiently zeroes in on your skill level, so it is crucial to review both foundational and advanced topics.

Scoring and Placement

Scores range from 200 to 300 per subtest, with different colleges setting their own cutoffs. For instance, a score of 250 on QAS might place you into college algebra, while 270 could place you into precalculus. A high score on the **College Math Accuplacer Study Guide** topics can directly translate to skipping developmental math courses, which often cost the same as credit courses but earn no college credit. This

makes studying a wise investment of your time.

KEY CONCEPTS TO MASTER FOR EACH SUBTEST

To create a focused study plan, you need to know exactly what each subtest covers. Below you will find the essential topics organized by section, with an emphasis on the skills most frequently tested.

Arithmetic Subtest

This section is the most basic, but many students underestimate it. Errors often occur with fractions, order of operations,

This is the most common subtest required by colleges. It bridges fundamental arithmetic and the algebra needed for STEM or business majors. Key topics include:

- Ratios, proportions, and unit rates
- Solving linear equations and inequalities in one variable

- Graphing linear equations on the coordinate plane (slope, intercepts)
- Systems of linear equations (solving by substitution or elimination)
- Exponents and roots, including scientific notation
- Polynomial arithmetic (addition, subtraction, multiplication, factoring)
- Basic probability (independent and dependent events)
- Descriptive statistics: mean, median, mode, range, and interpretation of graphs

The QAS section permits a calculator for some questions—usually the on-screen version provided by the test. Still, you

should be comfortable solving simple equations manually to save time. Many practice problems in a **College Math Accuplacer Study Guide** will emphasize translating English into algebraic expressions.

Advanced Algebra and Functions (AAF)

If you are aiming for calculus, precalculus, or advanced statistics, you will likely need the AAF subtest. This section is significantly more challenging and requires a firm grasp of high school algebra and trigonometry. Essential

- Quadratic equations: factoring, completing the square, quadratic formula

EFFECTIVE STUDY STRATEGIES FOR THE ACCUPLACER MATH TEST

Studying for the Accuplacer is not the same as cramming for a final exam. Because the test is adaptive and covers a wide range of material, you need a systematic approach. The following strategies will help you get the most out of your **College Math Accuplacer Study Guide**.

1. Take a Diagnostic Practice Test

Use a calendar to track your progress, and give yourself a day off per week to avoid burnout. Consistency is far more effective than marathon sessions right before the test.

3. Focus on Weak Areas with Targeted Drills

A generic **College Math Accuplacer Study Guide** will cover all topics, but you should customize your review. For example, if you struggle with fractions, do 20–30 fraction problems per day until

WHAT TO INCLUDE IN YOUR OWN STUDY GUIDE OUTLINE

Step 1: Subtract 3 from both sides $\rightarrow 2x = 8$
