Fiber- Rich Staples

for Your Pantry

- **Legumes:**
Lentils, chickpeas, black beans, and kidney beans are excellent sources of both soluble and insoluble fiber. They also provide plant-based protein, making them perfect for meatless meals.
- **Whole Grains:**
Oats, quinoa, brown rice, barley, and whole-wheat products deliver substantial fiber along with B vitamins and minerals. Choose whole grains over refined versions

whenever possible.

- **Fruits:** Berries, apples, pears, oranges, and bananas are fiber-rich and naturally low in fat. Leave the skin on apples and pears to maximize fiber content.
- **Vegetables:** Broccoli, Brussels sprouts, carrots, spinach, kale, and sweet potatoes are packed with fiber and nutrients. Aim to fill half your plate with vegetables at every meal.
- **Nuts and Seeds:** While higher in fat, almonds, walnuts, chia seeds, and flaxseeds contain

healthy unsaturated fats and considerable fiber. Use them in moderation as toppings or in smoothies.

Foods to Minimize or Avoid

- **Processed Meats:** Bacon, sausages, and deli meats are high in saturated fat and sodium, offering little to no fiber.
- **Full-Fat Dairy:** Butter, cream, full-fat cheese, and whole milk should be limited. Opt for low-fat or non-dairy alternatives fortified with

fiber.

- **Fried Foods:**
French fries, fried chicken, and doughnuts are calorie-dense and low in fiber, often containing trans fats.
- **Refined Grains:**
White bread, white rice, and regular pasta have been stripped of their fiber-rich bran and germ. Replace them with whole-grain versions.
- **High-Fat Desserts:**
Cakes, cookies, and pastries that combine sugar, butter, and refined flour are the antithesis of a low fat high fiber diet. Satisfy your sweet tooth with fresh fruit or

a small serving of dark chocolate (at least 70% cocoa).

SAMPLE MEAL IDEAS FOR A LOW FAT HIGH FIBER DIET

Breakfast

- Oatmeal made with rolled oats, topped with fresh berries, a tablespoon of chia seeds, and a splash of almond milk.
- Whole-grain toast with avocado (use a thin spread) and a side of sliced pear.
- Smoothie bowl with spinach, banana, frozen berries, flaxseed, and

unsweetened oat milk.

Lunch

- Quinoa salad with black beans, corn, diced bell peppers, cherry tomatoes, and a lime-cilantro dressing.
- Lentil soup with carrots, celery, and a side of whole-grain bread.
- Large leafy green salad topped with chickpeas, shredded carrots, cucumber, and a low-fat vinaigrette.
- Baked salmon (a source of healthy fat, use sparingly) with roasted sweet potatoes and steamed asparagus.
- Vegetable chili made with kidney beans, tomatoes, onions, and spices, served with a slice of cornbread made with whole-grain cornmeal.

Increase Fiber Gradually

If your current diet is low in fiber, adding large amounts overnight can cause bloating, gas, and discomfort. Gradually increase your intake by one or two servings per day over a week or two, and drink plenty of water. Fiber works

best when it can absorb water, so staying hydrated is essential for smooth digestion.

Read Labels Carefully

Many packaged foods claim to be low fat or high fiber but are often loaded with added sugars and refined ingredients. Look for products with at least 3 grams of fiber per serving and less than 5 grams of saturated fat. Ingredients lists should be short and recognizable.

Home Healthy More Fats Often

When you prepare meals from scratch, you have full control over the fat and fiber content of your food. Experiment with herbs and spices to add flavor without relying on butter or oil. Roasting vegetables, using vegetable broth for soups, and incorporating legumes into sauces are simple ways to boost fiber while reducing fat.

Don't Fear

While the focus is on low fat, it is important to distinguish between harmful saturated fats and beneficial unsaturated fats. OVERCOME THEM
