The saw featured a robust magnesium alloy housing, which was both lightweight and incredibly strong, able to withstand the bumps and drops that are part and parcel of tree work. The engine was a traditional two-stroke design, known for its simplicity and ease of repair. Many arborists learned to rebuild carburetors and replace piston rings on these saws because the design was so straightforward. The starter assembly, fuel system, and clutch were all engineered with a no-nonsense approach, prioritizing function over form. It is a saw that requires a skilled hand to start properly—priming, choking, and a solid pull. It lacks the convenience of a decompression valve or a toolless fuel cap. However, this very simplicity is part of its charm. Many users argue that the older saws feel more "solid," with fewer plastic components. The metal fuel tank and air filter cover of the 020 Av feel indestructible compared to the modern composite materials. This durable construction gives the 020 Av a unique tactile quality that is hard to replicate.

Collectibility, Maintenance, and Finding Parts

The Stihl 020 Av has transitioned from a primary work tool to a highly collectible item. You will find them for sale on online marketplaces, at tractor shows, and in the garages of retired arborists. A fully restored 020 Av in excellent condition can fetch a surprising price, reflecting its classic status. Collectors look for original paint, decals, and bar-and-chain sets. However, the true value often lies in a running, functional example that can still be used for light-duty work around the property.

Maintaining a vintage 020 Av requires some dedication.

- **Parts Availability:** Stihl has discontinued many specific parts for the 020 Av. However, the aftermarket community is strong. You can still find carburetor kits (Walbro or Zama), fuel lines, air filters, and ignition modules from third-party suppliers. NOS (New Old Stock) parts are sought after but can be expensive.
- **Fuel Mix:** It is critical to use the correct fuel-to-oil ratio, typically 50:1 with a high-quality synthetic oil designed for air-cooled two-stroke engines. A common mistake is using old or improperly mixed fuel, which can gum up the carburetor.

- **Common Issues:** The most frequent problems with the 020 Av include hardened fuel lines (which become brittle with age), failed carburetor diaphragms, and cracked impulse lines. The ignition modules can also fail over time, but they are usually replaceable with modern equivalents.
- **Restoration Guidance:** For those looking to restore a saw, start by cleaning the carburetor and replacing all fuel and impulse lines. Check the condition of the spark arrestor screen in the muffler, as a clogged screen can cause a dramatic loss of power. A compression test is also wise; a healthy saw should have at least 120 PSI.

Safety Considerations with a Vintage Saw

The chain brake on the 020 Av is a manual, inertia-activated design, but it is not as responsive or reliable as the brakes found on new saws.
