SIGNATURE PLAYS IN THE PLAYBOOK

The magic of this offense lies in its plays. Each run or pass is designed to look identical to another early in the down, only to attack a different gap. Below are some foundational plays from the

1. The Jet Sweep

The jet sweep is the cornerstone of the Wing T, and in the shotgun version it becomes even more dangerous. A receiver or wingback motions across the formation at full speed. 4. The Buck Sweep

No Wing T playbook is complete without the buck sweep. In the spread shotgun set, the buck sweep features a wingback blocking the end man on the line of scrimmage while a guard and tackle pull to the perimeter. The quarterback hands off to the running back, who reads the pulling linemen. This play effectively combines power with speed, allowing the offense to attack the edge with a man advantage.

5. Play-Action Bootleg

The pass game thrives on misdirection. After a series of rushing plays, the quarterback fakes a handoff to a jet sweep or buck sweep, then rolls out opposite the flow. The offensive line sells the run, and the receivers run clear-out routes or deep crossers. The bootleg gives the quarterback an easy read: either a deep out, a throwback to the weak side, or a run if the defense vacates the edge.

6. The Bubble Screen off Jet Motion

This is a spread staple that fits perfectly into the Wing T scheme. As the wingback motions across, the quarterback takes the snap and immediately fires a quick screen to the flank receiver.
