Overloadi ng with Text

Ignoring the Illustratio ns

Ensure that the illustration is simple and directly supports the text. For example, a sentence about a red ball should show a ball that is clearly red, not a multicolored playground scene.

Using Unfamiliar Vocabulary

It can be tempting to introduce new words through sentences, but if a child cannot decode or understand the key word, frustration may follow. If you do include a less familiar word, provide a picture clue or use it in a context that makes the meaning obvious. For instance, “The bird is in the nest” is understandable even if “nest” is new, because the sentence and picture work together.
