after two restart attempts, contact the Senior Web Team via Slack channel #web-support. After 15 minutes, call the on-call engineer."

6. Rollback Procedure

Every change carries risk. A professional IT Operations Runbook Template **must** include a step-by-step rollback plan. This is not optional. The rollback procedure should be as detailed as the primary procedure, allowing an engineer to revert the system to its previous stable state quickly.
