5. **Why does Matilda decide to play tricks on her parents? Do you think she is justified?**

3. **What does the arrival of the “platinum-blond man” (the car buyer) reveal about Mr. Wormwood’s business ethics?**
4. **Why do you think Matilda feels a sense of triumph after her trick on her father, even though she knows it is wrong?**

Vocabulary Spotlight: Point out words like “swindle,” “suspicious,” and “triumph.” Ask readers to use each word in a sentence related to the story.

CHAPTERS 7-9: MISS HONEY, THE TRUNCHBULL, AND THE PARENTS

The narrative shifts to school, introducing the two most important adult figures in Matilda’s life: the gentle Miss Honey and the terrifying Miss Trunchbull. The contrast between them is stark and central to the story’s tension.

Comprehension Questions for Chapters 7–9
