THE BEST CORN SYRUP SUBSTITUTES FOR HARD CANDY

Light Agave Nectar: A Neutral Option

- **¼ teaspoon cream of tartar.** This is your insurance policy against crystallization.

- **Optional: A few drops of food coloring.** Gel-based colors work best to avoid adding extra liquid.

- A heavy-bottomed, 2-to-3-quart saucepan. A light-colored pan helps you see the color of the syrup.
- A high-quality candy thermometer. This is non-negotiable. An instant-read thermometer will not work for this task.
- A silicone spatula or a heat-proof wooden spoon.
- A pastry brush and a small bowl of water.
- A well-greased metal baking sheet or a silicone candy mold.
- Parchment paper.

Step-by-Step Instructions

1. **Prepare Your Workstation:** Before you even turn on the stove, have everything ready. Your baking sheet or molds must be greased (or use a silicone mat which requires no grease). Measure out your flavoring and coloring. Candy making moves quickly at the end, and you won't have time to search for ingredients.
2. **Combine Base Ingredients:** In your clean, heavy-bottomed saucepan, combine the sugar, water, honey, and cream of tartar. Do not stir them together. Just gently swirl the pan to moisten the sugar. Stirring at this stage can splash sugar crystals onto the sides of the pan.
3. **Bring to a Boil:** Place the pan over medium-high heat. Let the mixture come to a rolling boil. Once it is boiling, you

can attach your candy thermometer to the side of the pan, ensuring the tip is submerged in the liquid but not touching the bottom of the pan.

4. **Wash Down the Sides (Crucial Step):** As the syrup boils, sugar crystals will inevitably form on the sides of the pan. These crystals can seed the entire batch. Using your pastry brush dipped in clean water, brush down the sides of the pan to dissolve any stray crystals. Do this until the temperature reaches about 230°F (110°C).
5. **Cook to Hard Crack Stage:** Continue to boil the syrup without stirring. Allow it to reach 300°F (150°C) on your thermometer. This is the "hard crack" stage. Be patient; this can take 10-15 minutes. Do not walk away! The temperature will climb slowly and then suddenly accelerate.
6. **Remove from Heat and Add Flavor:** The moment your syrup hits 300°F, immediately remove the pan from the heat. Let the bubbling subside for about 30 seconds. Then, carefully stir in your flavoring extract and food coloring with your silicone spatula. The mixture will bubble up violently for a moment. Stir quickly and evenly until the color is uniform.
7. **Pour and Cool:** Working quickly but carefully (the syrup is dangerously hot), pour the hot candy onto your prepared baking sheet or into your molds. If pouring onto a sheet, you can tilt the pan back and forth slightly to spread it into an even layer. Do not scrape the bottom or sides of the pot, as any undissolved sugar crystals there could ruin your candy.

8. **Let It Set:** Allow the candy to cool completely, undisturbed. This should take about 30 to 45 minutes. Do not touch it or move it while it is cooling.
9. **Break or Unmold:** Once the candy is completely cool and hard, it's ready. If you poured it onto a sheet, you can break it into pieces. A simple way to do this is to place the candy slab in a large zip-top bag and tap it gently with a rolling pin or meat mallet. If you used molds, simply pop the candies out.
10. **Dust and Store:** To prevent your hard candy from sticking together, dust the pieces lightly with confectioners' sugar. Store your homemade hard candy in an airtight container at room temperature. It will keep for weeks.

FLAVOR VARIATIONS TO TRY

One of the greatest joys of this **Hard Candy Recipe Without Corn Syrup** is the endless potential for customization. Here are a few ideas to get you started:

- **Classic Peppermint:** Use 1 teaspoon of peppermint extract and divide the batch to color half red and leave the other half clear. Swirl them together before they set for a classic pinwheel look.

- **Spiced Chai:** Add ½ teaspoon of chai spice blend (cinnamon, cardamom, ginger, cloves) and 1 teaspoon of vanilla extract to the hot syrup. This creates a warming, complex candy perfect for fall and winter.

TIPS FOR PERFECT HARD CANDY EVERY TIME
