- **Fats and Oils:** Butter, ghee, tallow, lard, and coconut oil.
- **Dairy (Choose Wisely):** Hard cheeses like cheddar, parmesan, and gouda have very little lactose. Soft cheeses like brie and cream cheese are also acceptable in moderation.
- **Water and Broth:** Bone broth and electrolyte water are crucial for hydration.

Foods to Avoid

To maintain a strict no-carb approach, the following must be eliminated:

A SAMPLE 7-DAY MENU FOR NO CARB DIET

The following sample menu is designed for a strict no-carb approach, focusing almost exclusively on animal products. It is high in fat, moderate in protein, and contains virtually zero carbohydrates. This plan is intended for informational purposes and should be adjusted based on individual appetite and activity level.

Day 1: The Classic Start

- **Breakfast:** 3 large eggs fried in butter, topped with 2 slices of crispy bacon.
- **Lunch:** Leftover grilled chicken thighs with a side of cheddar cheese cubes.

- **Breakfast:** Bacon and egg "muffins" (baked in a muffin tin with cheese).
- **Lunch:** Leftover lamb with a side of pickles (check for no sugar).
- **Dinner:** Large shrimp sautéed in garlic butter with a side of zucchini noodles (zucchini has carbs, so keep portions small).
- **Snack:** Hard-boiled eggs with mayonnaise.

Day 7: Feast Day

- **Breakfast:** Steak and eggs (a classic no-carb favorite).
- **Lunch:** Charcuterie board with hard cheeses, prosciutto, and salami.
- **Dinner:** Roasted chicken with crispy skin, accompanied by a butter sauce.
- **Snack:** Bone marrow roasted with salt.

Organ meats like liver are among the most nutrient-dense foods on the planet.

Listen to Your Body
