This style was the standard in American classrooms for much of the 20th century. Generations learned their "ABCs" with the Palmer Method, a direct forerunner

of modern American Cursive. However, with the advent of the typewriter and later the personal computer, the emphasis on penmanship rapidly declined. For many, cursive became a fading memory, a skill held by grandparents but no longer taught to children.
