Using a loan of £2,000 from his future father-in-law, he stocked the store with ornaments, fabrics, and objets d'art from Japan and the East. The venture was an immediate success, tapping into the Aesthetic Movement's love for Japanese design.

As the business flourished, Liberty expanded his offerings, introducing "Liberty silks" and "Liberty art fabrics" that became synonymous with artistic dress reform. By the 1890s, the store had outgrown its original premises, and the decision was made to build a new, purpose-built flagship. The result was the extraordinary building we still see today. Opened in 1924, the store was constructed from the timbers of two Royal Navy ships, HMS Hindustan and HMS Impregnable, giving the wood a unique history and a rich, dark patina that cannot be replicated. This deliberate choice reflected Liberty's commitment to both heritage and artistry.

Throughout the 20th century, Liberty continued to evolve, embracing Art Nouveau and later championing young British designers. The store's fabric department became legendary, and its annual Christmas window displays are now a highlight of the London festive calendar. Today, Liberty remains an independent

department store, now housed entirely on Regent Street, with a reputation for scouting emerging talent and preserving the values of quality and originality that Arthur Liberty established over 140 years ago.

THE ICONIC REGENT STREET BUILDING: A TUDOR REVIVAL MASTERPIECE

When you approach Liberty In London Regent Street, the first thing that strikes you is the building itself. In a street dominated by grand Edwardian and Victorian stone façades, Liberty's half-timbered Tudor revival structure stands out with dramatic flair. Designed by architects Edwin T. Hall and his son Edwin S. Hall, the building was intended to evoke an English manor house, complete with leaded windows, carved gables, and intricately detailed woodwork.

One of the most remarkable features is the use of "old English" oak timbers salvaged from two ships of the line. The building's interior is arranged around a central atrium, allowing natural light to flood the floors, and the staircase – a work of art in itself – winds upwards past galleries of curated goods.

Because Liberty occupies a corner position on Regent Street and Great Marlborough Street, it enjoys two equally impressive frontages. The store's size, at roughly 100,000 square feet

spread over seven floors, feels intimate despite its scale, thanks to the warren of small rooms and narrow corridors that mimic a house rather than a conventional department store. This architectural personality is a key reason why visitors return; it makes shopping feel like a discovery, not a chore.

Why Regent Street?

Regent Street itself is one of London's most famous thoroughfares, designed by John Nash in the early 19th century. The street was intended as a grand processional route from Regent's Park to Carlton House. Today, it is a major shopping destination, home to flagships from Burberry, Hamleys, and Apple. Liberty's presence here from the very beginning positioned it at the centre of London's commercial and cultural life. The synergy between Liberty's artistic offerings and the Regency grandeur of Regent Street creates a unique retail atmosphere that cannot be found anywhere else in the city.

One distinctive feature is the ability to find pieces that are exclusive to Liberty – the store often collaborates with designers to produce capsule collections that you cannot buy anywhere else.

The accessories hall on the ground floor is a jewellery lover's paradise. Here you will find everything from delicate gold pieces to bold costume jewellery, alongside a world-class selection of watches. The handbag collection ranges from heritage leather goods to contemporary It-bags, ensuring that every shopper's taste is catered for.

Homeware and Interiors

Liberty's homeware department is legendary for its range and eclecticism. Located on the first floor, it features furniture, lighting, tableware, and decorative objects from around the world. The store's own Liberty print home accessories – cushions,

mugs, lampshades, and stationery – are perennial bestsellers. The home section also showcases contemporary craft, with pieces from British potters, glassblowers, and textile artists. If you are redecorating or simply searching for a stunning gift, this department will inspire you.

The Fabric Department: A Creative Legacy

No visit to Liberty In London Regent Street is complete without wandering through the fabric department on the second floor. This is the heart of the store's heritage. Since Arthur Liberty's day, Liberty Fabrics have been revered for their floral prints, fine silks, and innovative use of colour. The department is a pilgrimage site for dressmakers, quilters, and interior designers. Rolls of fabric line the walls in a rainbow of hues, from classic "Liberty lawn" cottons to heavier upholstery materials. The staff are knowledgeable and passionate, often able to recommend the perfect print for a project. Liberty Fabrics have been used by everyone from Mary Quant to Paul Smith, and the tradition continues with frequent collaborations with contemporary artists.

Beauty and Fragrance

The beauty floor at Liberty is unlike any other. Instead of the high-pressure counters typical of many department stores, Liberty offers an edit of brands that are considered both luxurious

and ethical. You will find niche skincare lines like Dr. Barbara Sturm, Aesop, and Susanne Kaufmann, alongside makeup from By Terry and Charlotte Tilbury. The fragrance section is particularly well-regarded, stocking rare and artisanal perfumes from brands such as Byredo, Diptyque, and Jo Malone. Liberty also has a signature scent, “Liberty,” a sophisticated floral created in partnership with perfumers.

LIBERTY’S UNIQUE BRAND: PRINTS, COLLABORATIONS, AND CULTURE

The word “Liberty” itself has become a shorthand for a particular aesthetic: floral prints, artful eccentricity, and quality craftsmanship. The Liberty print is instantly recognizable – often featuring delicate florals, paisleys, or geometric patterns in a distinctive colour palette. These prints are not just limited to fabric; they appear on homeware, stationery, and even clothing. Liberty collaborates with other brands to create limited-edition products, such as Liberty print Converse sneakers, Liberty print Nutella jars, and Liberty print bicycle helmets. These collaborations are always highly anticipated and often sell out within days.

Beyond product, Liberty is a cultural hub. The store hosts regular events, including designer meet-and-greets, book signings, and workshops. Its café, the Liberty Café on the top floor, offers a delightful respite with views over the rooftops of Regent Street. The seasonal windows, especially at Christmas, are works of art in themselves, often telling whimsical stories using Liberty fabrics and props.

PRACTICAL TIPS FOR VISITING LIBERTY IN LONDON REGENT STREET

To make the most of your visit, consider arriving early on a weekday morning to avoid the biggest crowds.
