The average atomic mass is calculated by multiplying each isotope's mass by its fractional abundance and summing the results.

Mathematically, the formula is:

Average Atomic Mass =  $\Sigma$  (mass of isotope  $\times$  fractional abundance)

This concept is often a stumbling block for students because it requires both mathematical calculation and conceptual understanding. Thus, the mass number (protons + neutrons) is close to the actual mass in amu for most isotopes, but slight differences due to nuclear binding energy cause the atomic masses we observe to deviate slightly from whole numbers. The PhET simulation often displays these precise masses, reinforcing the subtle distinction between mass number and atomic mass.
