TIPS FOR STITCHING MARGARET SHERRY PATTERNS

Choose the Right Fabric and Thread

To capture the soft look of Sherry’s designs, use a high-quality Aida cloth (14 or 16 count) or evenweave linen. Her patterns typically call for DMC floss, which has a subtle sheen and excellent colorfastness. For best results, separate your floss strands and lay them flat to avoid twisting. Many stitchers recommend using a needle size 24 or 26 to prevent fabric distortion.

Pay Attention to Backstitch

Backstitch is crucial in Sherry’s designs because it defines the eyes, whiskers, and fur outlines. Use a single strand of floss for backstitch to keep lines neat and fine. Follow the chart closely – even a slight deviation can change the expression of an animal. Take your time on the face; the eyes are the soul of the design. If you want to add extra depth, consider using a slightly darker shade for the backstitch than the main color, as Sherry does in many of her originals.

Frame or Finish Creatively

Margaret Sherry designs lend themselves to more than just rectangular frames. Consider finishing as a small pillow ornament, a hanging door hanger, or a padded sachet filled with lavender. For baby showers or housewarmings, a small stitched hoop with a ribbon bow makes an instant gift. Because her designs are often compact, you can also stitch them onto clothing or tote bags using waste canvas.

Official Sources and Magazines

Start with the Margaret Sherry website or her publisher’s catalog. Many of her older patterns are archived in cross-stitch magazines available on second-hand sites like eBay or Etsy.
