Judgment and Decision-Making Sample Question

Scenario: You are a court officer stationed at the main entrance. A person with a metal walker approaches the metal detector. When it alarms, the person says they cannot remove the walker due to a medical condition. What is the most appropriate action?

1. Deny entry and ask them to leave.
2. Ignore the alarm because they have a mobility aid.
3. Conduct a pat-down search and visually inspect the walker.
4. Call a supervisor to make the decision.

Answer: Option C is the best choice. Security protocols require that all alarms be resolved. A pat-down and visual inspection respects the person's medical needs while ensuring safety. Denying entry (A) is too harsh, ignoring the alarm (B) violates security protocol, and calling a supervisor (D) may be unnecessary since you have the authority to perform a search.

Mathematics Sample Question

Question: A court officer patrols a hallway that is 120 feet long. If the officer walks at a speed of 3 feet per second, how many seconds will it take to walk the full length of the hallway?

1. 30 seconds
2. 36 seconds
3. 40 seconds
4. 45 seconds

Answer: Option C (40 seconds). Calculation: $\text{Time} = \text{Distance} \div \text{Speed} = 120 \text{ feet} \div 3 \text{ feet/second} = 40 \text{ seconds}$. This is a simple arithmetic question.

Written Expression Sample

Question

Directions: Choose the sentence that is grammatically correct.

1. The officer don't have to write a report.
2. The officer doesn't have to write a report.
3. The officer do not have to write a report.
4. The officer hasn't to write a report.

Answer: Option B. "Doesn't" is the correct contraction for "does not." Option A and C use incorrect verb forms. Option D is nonstandard.

Inductive Reasoning Sample Question

Question: All court officers in this building must wear a security badge. John is a court officer in this building. Which of the following must be true?

1. John wears a security badge.
2. John is the only officer who wears a badge.
3. Everyone wearing a badge is a court officer.
4. John does not wear a badge.

Answer: Option A. This is a classic syllogism. The rules state all officers wear badges, and John is an officer, so he must wear a badge. Option C is a common fallacy (the converse is not necessarily true).

HOW TO EFFECTIVELY USE NYS COURT OFFICER EXAM SAMPLE QUESTIONS
