Norway: The Western Coastline of the Peninsula

Denmark: The Bridge to Continental Europe

Start by locating the British Isles (UK and Ireland) on a map of Europe. Then look northeast to the North Sea. Directly across the North Sea, you will see Denmark and the Jutland Peninsula. Above Denmark, the large peninsula extending northward is the Scandinavian Peninsula, containing Norway and Sweden. Norway’s western coast is deeply indented, while Sweden’s eastern coast is more regular.

Using Latitude and Longitude for Precision

For those who prefer coordinates, the center of the Scandinavian region can be approximated at 62°N latitude and 15°E longitude. This point lies in central Sweden. The southern tip of Sweden is near 55°20'N, 13°00'E. Norway’s North Cape is at 71°10'N, 25°47'E. These coordinates can help you zoom in on any digital map application.

WHY SCANDINAVIA’S LOCATION MATTERS

Understanding where Scandinavia is on a map goes beyond mere trivia. The region’s location has shaped its history, economy, and culture. Its position in the far north means long, cold winters and short, mild summers. The Gulf Stream moderates the climate,
